Legal definition of fruit of the poisonous tree: a doctrine of evidence: evidence that is derived from or gathered during an illegal action (as an unlawful search). Fruit of the poisonous tree is a legal doctrine according to which any secondary evidence obtained from a source accessed through illicit means is inadmissible.
